The death of a Christian can be the catalyst for a wide range of emotional responses for the bereaved, ranging from gratitude for the end of suffering, joy that our loved one has entered more fully into the Lord's presence, and of course deep sadness, or even fear, at the necessity of facing life deprived of the physical presence of our loved one. Scripture bears witness to all of these seemingly incongruous realities. St. Paul reminds us that in Christ "Death has been swallowed up in victory," (1 Cor. 15.54), that we die "so that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life," (2 Cor. 5.4), and that in a real sense "we would rather be away from the bodyand at home with the Lord" (2 Cor. 5.8). Nevertheless "it does not yet appear what we shall be" at the resurrection (1 John 3.2), and indeed we know that the Lord himself wept for sorrow at the death of his dear friend Lazarus (John 11.35).

These responses to death are all very real and perfectly valid. And usually our response to the death of a loved one is some combination of all of them. So the Church's ritual surrounding death bears witness and gives voice to all of these responses. Perhaps above all else, the liturgy is serious. In it we give thanks to God for the life of our loved ones, and we plead to God prayerfully that he would continue to have mercy on the dead, that he would bring to fruition the salvation that he began to work in them during their mortal lives, all in the conviction that for God's faithful people, in the words of the liturgy, "life... is not taken away but changed." The Church's ritual surrounding death is therefore somber, yet charged with hope and spiritual joy.

This booklet is meant to help guide you through the liturgy. Note that at a 'Low Mass," all of the texts are said and not sung.

When the bell rings, all STAND. The celebrant and other ministers enter.

The Celebrant then reads THE INTROIT as follows

Introit. Requiem aternam. 2 Esdras 2:34-35.

Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord: and let light perpetual shine upon them. *Psalm 65:1–2.* Thou, O God, art praised in Zion, and unto thee shall the vow be performed in Jerusalem: thou that hearest the prayer, unto thee shall all flesh come. Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord, and let light perpetual shine upon them.

Then follow THE KYRIES

The celebrant says THE COLLECT

Celebrant The Lord be with you. *People* **And with thy spirit.**

At the conclusion of the Collect, the People respond

Amen.

The people SIT for THE LESSON(S)

One or two passages of Holy Scripture are read. A Psalm may be sung between the Lessons. Each lesson is concluded as follows:

Reader The Word of the Lord.
People **Thanks be to God.**

After the lessons, the Celebrant reads THE GRADUAL & TRACT.

Gradual. Requiem aternam. II Esdras 2:34-35.

Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord: and let light perpetual shine upon them. V. The righteous shall be had in everlasting remembrance: he will not be afraid of any evil tidings.

Tract. Absolve, Domine.

Absolve, O Lord, the souls of all the faithful departed: from every chain of sin. \hat{V} . And by the help of thy grace, may they be worthy to escape the judgment of condemnation: \hat{V} . and attain the fruition of everlasting light.

On All Souls' Day at the first or principal Mass, and at other Masses as desired is said THE SEQUENCE.

Day of wrath, and doom impending, David's word with Sibyl's blending, Heaven and earth in ashes ending.

Oh, what fear man's bosom rendeth, when from heaven the Judge descendeth, on whose sentence all dependeth.

Wondrous sound the trumpet flingeth; through earth's sepulchers it ringeth; all before the throne it bringeth.

Death is struck, and nature quaking, all creation is awaking, to its Judge an answer making.

Celebrant The Lord be with you.
People And with thy spirit.

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according John.

People Glory be to thee, O Lord.

At the conclusion of the Gospel:

Celebrant The Gospel of the Lord.People Praise be to thee, O Christ.

A homily may follow:

THE LITURGY OF THE SACRIFICE

Before preparing the Altar, the celebrant reads the OFFERTORY, first saying.

The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Offertory: Domine, Iesu Christi.

O Lord Jesus Christ, King of Majesty, deliver the souls of all the faithful departed from the hand of hell, and from the pit of destruction: deliver them from the lion's mouth, that the grave devour them not; that they go not down to the realms of darkness: but let Michael, the holy standard-bearer, make speed to restore them to the brightness of glory: which thou hast promised in ages past to Abraham and his seed. V. Sacrifice and prayer do we offer to thee, O Lord: do thou accept them for the souls departed, in whose memory we make this oblation: and grant them, Lord, to pass from death unto life: which thou hast promised in ages past to Abraham and his seed.

The Celebrant announces the Mass intentions then says

Pray, brothers and sisters, that this my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the Father Almighty.

People May the Lord receive this sacrifice at thy hands, to the praise and glory of his Name, both to our benefit, and that of all his holy Church.

Celebrant Amen.

The Celebrant then says THE SECRET, which he prays quietly, concluding aloud

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying,

"Take, eat, THIS IS MY BODY

which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

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Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying,

"Drink ye all of this; for THIS IS MY BLOOD

of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins.

Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be # filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

Here may be made a commemoration of the departed.

Remember, Lord, also the souls of thy servants and handmaids which are gone before us with the mark of faith, and rest in the sleep of peace, [N. (and N.)].

We beseech thee, O Lord, that unto them, and unto all such as rest in Christ, thou wilt grant a place of refreshing, of light, and of peace. And vouchsafe to give unto us some portion and fellowship with thy holy Apostles and Martyrs..., and with all thy Saints; within whose fellowship we beseech thee to admit us.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. **AMEN**.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Showing the sacred Host to the people, the Celebrant says

SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

In union, O Dear Lord, with the faithful at every altar of thy Church, where thy blessed Body and Blood are being offered to the Father, I desire to offer thee praise and thanksgiving. I present to thee my soul and body, with the earnest wish that I may ever be united to thee. And since I cannot now receive thee sacramentally, I beseech thee to come spiritually into my heart. I unite myself to thee, and embrace thee with all the affections of my soul. O let nothing ever separate me from thee. Let me live and die in thy love. Amen.

Grant, O Lord Jesus Christ, that as the hem of thy garment, touched in faith, healed the woman who could not touch thy Body, so the soul of thy servant may be healed by like faith in thee, whom I cannot now sacramentally receive; through thy tender mercy, who livest and reignest with the Father in the unity of the Holy Ghost ever one God. Amen.

After the communion, the following verse is said.

Communion. Lux aterna. II Esdras 2:35.

May light eternal shine, O Lord, upon them, for endless ages with thy blessed ones, for thou art gracious. Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord: and let light perpetual shine upon them, for endless ages with thy blessed ones, for thou art gracious.

The celebrant then says the following or another proper POSTCOMMUNION

Almighty God, we thank thee that in thy great love thou hast fed us with the spiritual food and drink of the Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, and hast given unto us a foretaste of thy heavenly banquet. Grant that this Sacrament may be unto us a comfort in affliction, and a pledge of our inheritance in that kingdom where there is no death, neither sorrow nor crying, but the fullness of joy with all thy saints; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

No blessing is given.

The following is said for the DISMISSAL:

Appendix: The Gregorian Canon

The following translation of the Gregorian Canon (the Eucharistic prayer of the Western Church before the Reformation) is that of Salisbury Cathedral, made by Miles Coverdale.

Through the same Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Therefore, Lord, we beseech thee, that thou wilt graciously receive this oblation of our bounden service, and of all thy household:

And do thou order our days in thy peace, and command us to be delivered from eternal damnation, and to be numbered in the flock of thine elect. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

Which oblation, we beseech thee, O Almighty God, in all things to make blessed, appointed, ratified, reasonable and acceptable, that unto us it may be the Body and Blood of thy most dearly beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Who the next day afore he suffered, took bread into his holy and reverent hands, and his eyes being lifted into heaven unto thee, God almighty his Father, rendering thanks unto thee, he blessed, he brake, and gave unto his disciples, saying: Take and eat this, ye all. For this is my body.

Likewise after they had supped, he taking this excellent Cup into his holy and reverent hands, rendering thanks also unto thee, blessed, and gave unto his disciples, saying, Take and drink of this, ye all.

For this is the cup of my blood of the new and everlasting testament: the mystery of faith: which for you and for many shall be shed to the remission of sins. As oft as ye do these things, ye shall do them in remembrance of me.

Wherefore, O Lord, we also, thy servants, and thy holy people, being mindful as well of the blessed passion and resurrection, as of the glorious ascension of the same Christ thy Son, our Lord God, do offer unto thy excellent Majesty of thy own rewards and gifts, a pure host, a holy host, an undefiled host, the holy bread of eternal life, and the cup of eternal salvation.

Vouchsafe thou also, with a merciful and pleasant countenance, to have respect hereunto: and to accept the same, as thou didst vouchsafe to accept the gifts of thy righteous servant Abel, and the sacrifice of our Patriarch Abraham, and the holy sacrifice, the undefiled host, that the high priest Melchisedek did offer unto thee.

We humbly beseech thee, O Almighty God, command thou these to be brought by the hand of thy holy Angel unto thy high Altar in the presence of thy Divine Majesty, that as many of us as of this partaking of the Altar shall receive thy Son's holy Body and Blood may be replenished with all heavenly # benediction and grace. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

By whom, O Lord, all these good things thou dost ever create, thou sanctifiest, thou quickenest, thou blessest, and givest unto us.

Through him, and with him, and in him, is unto thee, God the Father Almighty, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory. World without end. **AMEN**.
